WHO DO WE SERVE?

We serve young people from the ages of 6 to 16 who face adversity and are in need of an additional caring and consistent developmental relationship.

HOW DO WE IGNITE POTENTIAL?

We provide 1:1 mentoring services that:

- Intentionally recruit volunteers based on the needs of young people in our community.
- Match young people with a professionally-screened volunteer mentor.
- Monitor and support the match with a professional caseworker.

We offer the following group programs:

- Go Girls! focuses on physical activity, balanced eating & self-esteem
- Game On! engages participants in the pursuit of lifelong healthy lifestyles
- After School Programs
- Summer Camps

WHAT IS THE IMPACT?

We know that if we serve young people who face adversity by matching them with a mentor, and if they are committed to our mentoring programs over a period of time, they will have:

- / Greater social emotional competence.
- Improved mental health & well-being.
- Increased educational engagement & employment readiness.



WHO WE SERVED IN 2023 -Mentoring team report

Big Brothers Big Sisters of Lanark County continued to provide children and youth across Lanark County with impactful mentoring opportunities. These opportunities included one to one community-based matches, one to one and group school-based matches, Summer Camps, and our WAK Youth Program. 2023 saw the return to a more normal time for volunteering as well. We increased the number of children and youth we served by adding new volunteers to all of our mentoring programs. Four university and college placement students, four Teen mentors and a Co-op student also helped us serve more kids in 2023.

Community Based Program - Traditional 1:1

The core mentoring program of all Big Brother Big Sisters agencies across Canada is the Community Based one to one program. This mentoring program is the most impactful mentoring relationship offered by Big Brothers Big Sisters of Lanark County. Our Community Based "Traditional" program matches a child or youth with a caring, stable adult mentor. They spend time together each week engaging in fun activities in their community. Through these outings, a positive relationship is developed. The result can be a life changing experience for both the mentor and the mentee

Growth within this program remains a priority. In 2023, while 7 matches closed, 11 new matches were established. A total of 26 mentors and their mentees enjoyed some wonderful experiences and times together in 2023.



In-School Mentoring Program (Adult, Co-Op, College/University Placement)

Our In-School Mentoring program continued to provide 1:1 mentoring opportunities throughout the County in 2023. The In-School Mentoring program provides children and youth with a role model and a friend to talk with and share their experiences of growing up.

In 2023, 23 children were mentored in our Adult In-School Mentoring program and an additional 18 children were mentored in our College/University ISM program. Our Teen ISM and Co-op ISM program helped another 14 children. Over all 55 children benefitted from the care, compassion and friendship through their In-School Mentoring program mentors.



Go Girls! Healthy Bodies, Healthy Minds/Game On! Eat Smart Play Smart

Big Brothers Big Sisters of Lanark County offered our Game On! and Go Girls group mentoring programs that address topics such as healthy relationships, healthy eating, the importance of physical activity, and other unique challenges that middle-school aged children face to schools across the county. In 2023, we served 14 boys through our Game On! Program and 30 girls through Go Girls!



After School Program

With the help of Jumpstart funding, our popular After School Program was able to serve a total of 98 children in 2023. Using a combination of physical activities, healthy snacks, positive self-esteem building activities, mental health promotion and mentorship, BBBS staff and volunteers provide an active, safe and supportive environment for children to develop and enhance a healthy life style through physical activity, fair play and fun.




Summer Program

In the summer of 2023 Big Brothers Big Sisters of Lanark County offered two different Summer Programs. The first Summer Program was our usual summer program in partnership with the Town of Smiths Falls. The program was facilitated by summer students in and around the Youth Arena, provided in kind, by the Town of Smiths Falls. The Summer Program provided seven weeks of day camp for area children aged 7-11. Each week a new group of children attended and enjoyed a variety of sports, arts and crafts and other fun activities. Over the seven weeks there were 80 visits to the camp serving 45 individual children.



The second Summer Program was our Keeping Girls in Sports Summer Camp. In partnership with Jump Start and Duncan J Schoular Public School 20 girls attended a 7-week camp that provided them the fundamentals of sport, learning agility, balance and co-ordination through a combination of traditional and non-traditional sports and games. A secondary component of the program was for the girls to develop a love for sports that might ensure they stayed actively involved in a sport long term.

We are Kids (WAK) Youth Program

Our WAK Youth Program continued to flourish in their new space. Open three afternoons a week WAK saw solid growth in the number of regular participants over the year. Providing a safe and welcoming space for all during the "critical hours" has become a hallmark of the WAK program. Participants can decompress, relax, engage in learning valuable life skills, and feel safe to express themselves. Serving a nutritious meal each afternoon ensured all participants aren't going home hungry. In many cases participants were able to take food home to their families. A total of 106 participants were served by and benefitted from attending the WAK Program in 2023.

REIGNITING OUR POTENTIAL



The Reigniting Our Potential project developed and implemented an interactive 2SLGBTQIA+ resource and education kit that provided inclusion training for youth and service providers in a rural context. BBBS, in collaboration with Queer Connections Lanark, is continually evolving to meet the needs of youth, and this project played a key role in improving the agencies' equity and inclusion programming.

Project deliverables included;

-development and implementation of a rurally relevant 2SLGBTQIA+ training package to improve service delivery for 2SLGBTQIA+ youth in Lanark County

-training for 25 BBBS staff, volunteers/mentors, and 10 community agencies/schools/partners

-developing, revitalizing and deepening community partnerships for BBBS and QCL and creating the

potential for future program development and expansion

-distribution of project resources to other BBBS agencies and community partners across Ontario

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

RESOURCE DEVELOPMENT REPORT

Our local agency has been in existence for 50 years, and nationally BBBS has been in Canada for over 100 years. To ensure that we provide safe and effective mentoring programs for local children, we employ trained and experienced Social Service Workers. We know that mentoring changes the lives of children. In fact, for every \$1 spent on mentoring, \$23 is returned to society. (Boston Consulting Group)

We have always felt that, to sustain ourselves over the long haul, we need to diversify our sources of funding. In 2023 we returned to a more stable social environment for our events and fundraising initiatives, leading us to some new supporters. Big Brothers Big Sisters' agencies in Canada are independent agencies that do not typically receive sustained government funding, so our donors help make our work possible.








2023 Revenue Sources
